State of the City 2023



On January 3, 2023 at 6:00 p.m., Olean Common Council members old and new, city department heads, family members, and residents filed into the Council Chambers for the annual meeting of the Olean Common Council. New members of the Council were administered the oath of office, members voted for the Council President and Mayor Aiello gave his 10th State of the City Address. He mentioned the First National in his address:

This year the First National opened as a residential tower and it provides an excellent example of Olean's grit and determination. The building's fate was tied to a rollercoaster for well over 25 years. So many times it was going to be redeveloped--and as many times it fell through. But a group of people never gave up on it—including the city's Community Development Office, members of the Olean Urban Renewal Agency and the Common Council.

Ultimately the Savarino Companies took possession and redeveloped the building. But this year as the scaffolding came down and as the lights in the apartments began to shine, Olean residents were reminded that anything is possible—as long as you never give up and abandon your cause.

Februarv 1917 the Palace Theatre opened in Olean. The opening night program included music, vaudeville, and the photoplay (or silent movie), "Miss George Washington" starring Marguerite Clark. Tickets were \$1 for seating in the orchestra and balcony; 50 cents for seating in the gallery.



Built by Charles Bordonaro, the Palace was designed by Leon H. Lempert, Jr., an architect known for bowled auditoriums. The Palace Theatre provided Olean residents with first rate entertainment until it was demolished in 1998. For more information follow this link: Olean Times Herald.

The St. Bonaventure University Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Teams helped the City of Olean with a mid-winter litter pick-up on January 11, 2023. Head Coach Mike Smiechowski brought his teams of almost 50 swimmers and divers to Downtown Olean to clean -up Union and State Streets in an event that was organized by Tom Buttafarro, St. Bonaventure University Director of Government and Community Relations.




"Grants helped fund the field house at Bradner Stadium and renovate the ice rink and other facilities at the Recreation Center.

"Grants helped build Lincoln Square, Trailhead Parklet, and upgraded King Street Park. Marianne and Erick Laine provided the funding to restore the entrance to Oak Hill Park. A new playground was installed near Homer Hill. The City, through the Cattaraugus County Land Bank, secured property which will

enhance the entrance of Franchot. With the help of Cattaraugus County, Forness Park was upgraded and we received a grant to plant new trees around the pond.
