always been known for it restaurants and the chefs that brought fine cuisine and old world hospitality to our humble town. Each year at Taste of Olean, the Greater Olean Area Chamber of Commerce honors our local chefs—past and present—and it leads to a trip down memory lane for many.

The chamber has honored Patsy Piccioli who was a renowned chef in town. He had purchased his North Barry Street restaurant from Lucia Bardenette, another wellknown restaurateur who was also one of Olean's first businesswomen. She also started Lucia's. As for the North Barry Street restaurant, it was purchased by Neil and Denis Goodemote-the two men who had originally opened the Beefn-Barrel on North Union Street.

Wow! That was just one building—as was the Beef-n-Barrel when it opened—seating only seventy-five patrons.

Angee's opened in 1948 and has been operated by a member of the Fratercangelo family ever since—at the same location on North Union Street.

The late Louis Marra started a restaurant dynasty when he opened the Downtown Deli. He followed up with number of other eateries including The Old Library. Many of his children entered into the business and opened their own establishments throughout the area.

The North Union Street project has begun! Upgrades to the railroad crossing are in progress. At the end of the six week endeavor a median from Sullivan Street to the Olean Center Mall entrance will be in place. There are inevitable traffic delays and parking restrictions. Even if you are avoiding the delays with alternate routes, please do not avoid the North Union Street businesses. They need everyone's continued support throughout the two and a half year project.

around the city and collecting the leaves.

Keep an eye on Bradner Stadium. Work will soon begin on a facility that will house the restrooms and concession stands.

MANUFACTURING DAY OCTOBER 3, 2014

Mayor Aiello proclaimed October 3 Manufacturing Day in the City of Olean in conjunction with the National Association of Manufacturers, the Manufacturers Association of the Southern Tier and Dream It, Do It. In his proclamation, Mayor Aiello said that manufacturing is dependent on innovation and fresh approaches to fuel productivity and economic development, which in turn expands employment opportunities and boosts the standard of living and economic vitality.

He added, "The City of Olean is proud of its manufacturing sector and corporate leaders who are reaching out to the local community to grow candidates for the highly-skilled jobs they need to fill their workforce. The resulting "Dream It, Do It" is a national campaign that has taken hold in the City of Olean: Cutco Corporation, Cytec Industries, Dresser-Rand, Mazza Mechanical Services, Napoleon Engineering Services, National Grid, Pierce Steel Fabricators, Scott Rotary Seals and SolEpoxy have invited 400 students from 13 local schools into their factories to promote training, education and career choices that will grow our community."

National Manufacturing Day educates and prepares students and stimulates their interest in engineering, technology, productive work habits and other skills needed to fill many of the specialty jobs available in our local manufacturing community.

In his proclamation the Mayor added, "The City of Olean is supportive of the "Dream It, Do It" partnership between our local manufacturing sector and our schools that will provide the needed skills to our area's young people and keep them in the community."

Evelyn Sabina of Dream It, Do It accepted the proclamation at the September 23, 2014 Common Council Meeting and copies of the proclamation were distributed to the local manufacturing participants.

On Manufacturing Day, Mayor Aiello toured Dresser Rand with the General Manager John Stahley and a group of students from Olean High School.

















St. Joseph's Maronite Church in Dedicated

On October 25, 2014 St. Joseph's Maronite Catholic Church dedicated their new Church Complex on Walnut Street. In attendance at the ceremony were Bishop Gregory Mansour of the Eparchy of St. Maron of Brooklyn, NY and Bishop Richard Malone of the Buffalo Roman Catholic Diocese.

Mayor Aiello gave a proclamation congratulating Father Anthony Salim and the St. Joseph congregation. The Mayor sited that the original St. Joseph Ma-



ronite Church was dedicated in 1919 to serve the spiritual needs of Oleans' Syrian-American and Lebanese-American community of diverse Eastern-rite traditions. On the afternoon of August 27, 2011 a fire roared

through the Church and destroyed the structure, but not the congregation. The very next day the St. Joseph parishioners celebrated the Divine Liturgy, together with their friends, at St. Mary's of the Angels Church and arrangements were made for the congregation to temporarily move into Transfiguration Oratory on Walnut Street. Since then St. Joseph's Maronite Catholic Church purchased the Oratory from the Diocese of Buffalo and has completed a \$1.7 million dollar construction and renovation project.

At the ceremony Olean Firefighter Steve Zlockie was recognized by the National Apostolate of Maronites and received the Silver Massabki Award for his service to St. Joseph's Church. In 1860 the three Massabki brothers were martyred for their faith
