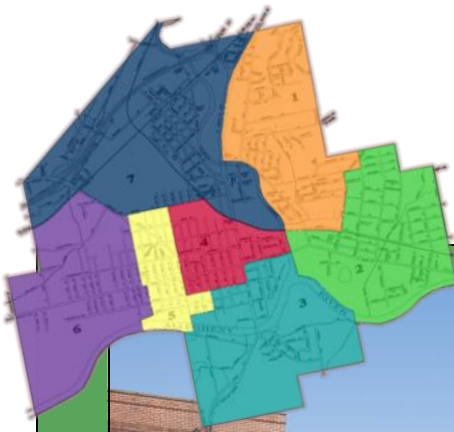

Action!

Before North Union Street opened-up to traffic, Mayor Aiello, Council President Adam Jester, Brittani Jones and Sharon Myers got to give the City's new rotaries a go. High above the action, aboard the City's ladder truck, Danny Bush, the multi-media producer at St. Bonaventure University, video taped the event for *Walkable Olean: Navigating Roundabouts*.

In 1805 Adam Hoops donated a plot of land in Olean to be used as a public cemetery. As the City grew Oak Lawn Cemetery found itself in the geographic center of the community. Many houses were built around the cemetery and plenty of children lived in the area.

At the Common Council Meeting of September 23, 1904 the Finance Committee presented a report about Oak Lawn Cemetery. There had been discussion about erecting a fence around the cemetery. The committee said that a basic fence would cost thousands of dollars. A fence with ornamentation would cost even more. The finance committee, with the deepest respect for the families of loved ones buried at the cemetery, made a suggestion.....



“If it could be discontinued as a cemetery and converted into a public park it would be of great benefit to the people of the City...The children from the whole of City west of Union Street could use it without the necessity of crossing Union Street...the ground would lend itself admirable to park purposes and nature has already done a great deal toward furnishing the base of ornamenting it in the way of trees...”

On May 5, 1905 with the approval of the Governor, the City was authorized to acquire Oak Lawn Cemetery for the purpose of establishing a public park, to move the graves in the park to another location and to issue a bond for the purpose of doing so.

Oak Hill Park as we know it today was on its way....

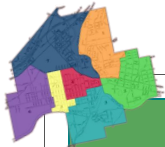
