

# Around & About Olean

The City of Olean thanks National Grid for the corporation's donation of manpower and equipment. On April 5, 2017 twelve employees helped the city plant a number of new trees and maintain existing trees in Mount View Cemetery.

Their continued support of the City's Forester and the Department of Public Works is appreciated and should be commended.

In addition the City thanks Gordon Scott, of Scott's Lawn and Landscape Service. He donated three yards of mulch that was used in the planting of the new trees.





In 1805 Adam Hoops donated a plot of land in Olean to be used as a public cemetery. As the City grew Oak Lawn Cemetery found itself in the geographic center of the community. Many houses were built around the cemetery and plenty of children lived in the area.

At the Common Council Meeting of September 23, 1904 the Finance Committee presented a report about Oak Lawn Cemetery. There had been discussion about erecting a fence around the cemetery. The committee said that a basic fence would cost thousands of dollars. A fence with ornamentation would cost even more. The finance committee, with the deepest respect for the families of loved ones buried at the cemetery, made a suggestion.....



‘If it could be discontinued as a cemetery and converted into a public park it would be of great benefit to the people of the City...The children from the whole of City west of Union Street could use it without the necessity of crossing Union Street...the ground would lend itself admirable to park purposes and nature has already done a great deal toward furnishing the base of ornamenting it in the way of trees...’

On May 5, 1905 with the approval of the Governor, the City was authorized to acquire Oak Lawn Cemetery for the purpose of establishing a public park, to move the graves in the park to another location and to issue a bond for the purpose of doing so.

Oak Hill Park as we know it today was on its way....

The Common Council passed a budget and I thank them for their diligence and dedication to Olean. It is going to be a tight year, but we will persevere, we always do—and always will.

There has been talk about the SPCA. We are in contract negotiations with the agency. We understand each other’s fiscal

Money has been cut from our budget for tree removal. Luckily during the storm on May 1 we had very little tree damage. The City’s Forester Sue Cooper along with our parks and streets department traveled the City after the storm and found 8 trees down—three of which were on City property.

We had our Annual Easter Egg Hunt—the City’s Parks Department out did themselves again this year.



- the North Third Street Complete Street Project;*
- the installation of a new hangar and fencing at the Olean Airport; and*
- the current and ongoing upgrades to the Wastewater Treatment Plant.*

*In addition to the major projects, Mr. Windus led the department which has the responsibility for all the infrastructure in the City.
